

At its March meeting, Kearny Camp Brother Peter Lindsay, was given his Past Camp Commander Certificate.







HIGHLIGHTED MEMBER OF THE DEPARTMENT OF

NEW JERSEY AND THEIR ANCESTOR

PDC Jeff Heagy and Patrick Gallagher

Past Department Commander Jeff Heagy was born and raised in the City of Lancaster, Pennsylvania. He attended Thaddeus Stevens Elementary School during the Civil War Centennial where he developed a growing interest in the Great Rebellion. At John F. Reynolds Junior High School, Jeff was honored as the Most Valuable Bandsman. He still wears his pewter award pin on his forage cap.



As an English major at Penn State University, Jeff met the lasting love of his life, Debra Shaw. They were married in 1979 and raised 3 Penn State graduates.

In September, 1994, Jeff was initiated into Anna M. Ross Camp #1, SUVCW being sponsored by then Commander in Chief Elmer "Bud" Atkinson. At the same time, he joined Co. C 28th PVI (SVR) and the 28th Pennsylvania Regimental Brass Band. In January 1996, his company promoted him and transferred his family to Baltimore, when he joined Garfield Camp #1 as a Dual Member. Jeff was elected Junior Vice Commander which was his first office in the SUVCW. In the summer of '97, he returned to the Philly suburbs and served as Camp Council filling a sudden vacancy in Camp 1. Jeff was subsequently elected to the Board of Directors of the GAR Civil War Museum and served for 8 years. In 2001, he was elected Commander of Ross Camp and served two terms. A few years later, in 2005, he joined the newly formed Baker-Fisher Camp #101 as a Dual Member and served as Patriotic Instructor.

In 2007, Jeff assisted Past Camp Commander Les Salsbury in forming New Jersey's Sgt. Hiram W. Pursell Camp 104. He served 3 terms as the initial

Commander and in December 2020, he was again returned to the Camp Commander's chair which he now holds.

The success of Camp 104 inspired the Department of New Jersey to nominate Jeff to serve through the elected chairs of office.

In September 2015, Jeff retired from many years of sales and management in the private sector. He now devotes his time to his passions of music, civil war history, Penn State football, and his two granddaughters: Scarlett (4-1/2) and Ellie (1-1/2).

Jeff proudly traces his Civil War ancestry to his maternal great great grandfather, Patrick Gallagher.



Private PATRICK GALLAGHER

Patrick Gallagher was born in Carrick, County Donegal, Ireland in 1840, the son of William Gallagher and Jane Clark. He emigrated to the United States shortly before the Civil War and resided in East in Township, near Downingtown, Pennsylvania, and worked as a laborer for the Pennsylvania Railroad. On September 25, 1861 Patrick enlisted as a Private in Co B., of the 53rd Pennsylvania Volunteers of Chester County, for a term of one year. The Regiment took a prominent part in the engagement with the Confederates in Fair Oaks, Virginia on June 1, 1862. The Regiment was also under fire at Malvern Hill and thence to a fierce battle at Antietam, where the 53rd was chosen to drive the enemy from their strong position at the "Sunken Road". The mission was accomplished. After resting at Bolivar Heights, the Regiment then proceeded to drive the enemy from Charlestown, W. Va.


Patrick was honorably discharged from the 53rd on October 23, 1862, at Harper's Ferry and immediately enlisted in the regular service on October 24, 1862 for a two-year term and was paid a bounty of \$100. He was assigned to Company B, 1st Regiment, U. S. Cavalry, 5th Corps, Army of the Potomac. Up until this time, the Federal cavalry was very ineffective against the rebels and had to reorganized with experience horsemen.

Patrick was engaged with the Regiment in Virginia during cavalry skirmishes in Kelly's Raid - March 17, 1863, and Stoneman's Raid, May 1863, and Beverly Ford - June 9th, 1863. Patrick was captured at Shelby's Gap on June 21st, 1863 and confined at Richmond, Va. He was exchanged for Confederates prisoners on July 5th 1863.

The Regiment was engaged again at Manassas Junction and Catlett's Station November 5, 1863. There were a number of skirmishes around Richmond before the battle of Cold Harbor on May 31st, and June 1st, 1864, where Captain Samuel McKee of Company B was mortally wounded.

Besides the battles mentioned above, Patrick shared the fortunes of the Regiment in Sheridan's First Raid - May 25th to June 1st, 1864; the Wilderness - May 7th and 8th 1864; Sheridan's Second Raid - June 10th to 25th 1864; Deep Bottom -July 27th 1864; Rockville - July 10th to 13th, 1864; and Suckers Gap - July 17th 1864. He was honorably discharged at camp near Middletown, Virginia on October 24, 1864 at the conclusion of the Battle of Cedar Creek. He married Annie Sheehy, a native of Thurles, County Tipperary, Ireland, in 1866 at West Chester and they resided in Downingtown, Pa. He had eleven children.

Patrick worked on the Pennsylvania railroad after the war and died at a very young age in 1892 of illness incurred during his war service, He was mustered into the Hancock Post #255, GAR, on June 15, 1882. In 1887 he served a term as Quartermaster.



READ ANY GOOD BOOKS LATELY?




Lincoln and the Fight for Peace by John Avlon

In this book, the author examines the well-known, yet surprisingly little discussed, two-week trip President Lincoln took to Virginia after the fall of Richmond.

It is often discussed that Lincoln met with Grant and

Sherman and others, to discuss bringing the war to a close

and the handling of the post war South, but little is mentioned of the sheer joy Lincoln felt at that time that the terrible war would soon be over and how he enjoyed just simply walking around Richmond (ignoring the danger this placed him in). The book later focuses on Lincoln's "Let 'em up easy" approach to future reconstruction. While acknowledging that an assassin's bullet prevented that approach from coming to fruition, the author extrapolates that philosophy in later wars involving the United States. Quite validly, the author makes the point that the harsh treatment of Germany after WWI led, in part, to WWII. By contrast, things like the Marshall Plan led to peace in Europe since. Quoting General Lucius Clay,



architect of the post-WWII German occupation, when asked what guided his decisions: "I tried to think of the kind of occupation the South would have had if Abraham Lincoln had lived."

Unfortunately, the book contains several factual errors such as presenting as fact, the thoroughly disproven myth, that Lincoln prophesied his imminent death by way of a dream the night before his assassination, among others. This is inexcusable poor research and fact checking which tarnishes an otherwise useful work. Worth reading for the treatment of Lincoln's happiest moments at the end of the war which has not be so extensively examined elsewhere.

In this issue we have something different. This quotation about Gettysburg by a Union General is encrypted using the "rail fence" method, which was used during the Civil War. In a rail fence cipher, the message is written downwards diagonally on successive "rails" of an imaginary fence, then moving up when the bottom rail is reached, down again when the top rail is reached, and so on until the whole message is written out. The coded message is then read off in rows. The code can be varied by the number of rails employed.

Give us this day our daily ration of hardtack;


and forgive us some of our deserters,
